Webinar Content and Delivery

1. Relevance and Timeliness: Each session was designed around pressing topics that hold significance in today's socio-cultural landscape. The focus on subjects like urban innovation, migration, and the role of civil society ensured that attendees engaged with pertinent and up-to-the-minute information.

2. Structured Flow: The webinars were methodically structured, starting with a short introduction of the project, followed by the presentation of the case study and a panel discussion, and concluding with a Q&A segment. This flow made it easier for attendees to follow along and absorb the information.

3. Engaging Visuals: The use of infographics and slides enhanced understanding and kept the audience engaged. Visual aids acted as anchors, helping attendees retain complex information.

4. Interactive Elements: The Q&A section combined with interactive discussions not only sustained audience interest but also fostered a two-way communication channel. This allowed for immediate feedback and clarified doubts in real-time.

5. Expert Delivery: The presenters were well-versed in their subjects, delivering content with confidence and passion. Their expertise lent credibility to the webinars and made them even more compelling.

6. Post-Webinar Resources & Activities: Recognizing the importance of ongoing learning, each session was recorded and made available on the dedicated TESI project's YouTube channel. This enables attendees, as well as those who could not participate in real-time, to revisit the content at their own time. Attendees were also formally acknowledged for their participation through receiving a Certificate of Attendance, and thus the professional value of the webinar series was further enhanced (please refer to Appendices for a template of certificate).





Cultural Mediators as Communication Professionals in the Context of Migration/Protection

WEDNESDAY, MAY 31ST 4 PM - 6 PM CEST

Curated by the University of Belgrade

- Focus on the role of cultural mediators in the context of migration and protection, exploring how they fit into social innovation frameworks. Cultural mediators often work in vulnerable settings like the peak of the European Refugee crisis, aiming to facilitate communication between service providers and migrants. Despite their crucial role, the profession is not yet standardized, lacking in specific training centered on their unique communication needs.
- The webinar addresses a gap in training for cultural mediators, emphasizing that they are primarily communication professionals. The goal is to make them objective yet empathic, understanding both the migrants' and service providers' perspectives.
- The role of cultural mediators is identified as pivotal in social innovation. They empower marginalized groups, satisfy unmet human needs, and potentially reform institutional approaches towards migrants, helping to resolve asymmetric power relations.
- A quality management professor pointed out the absence of a unified standard or system for cultural mediators. The discussion acknowledged that both mistrust and easier rapport could exist within migrant communities toward mediators, suggesting a need for further academic research.

What children think? Child-centred approach as Social innovation in Education

THURSDAY, JUNE 8TH 2 PM - 4 PM CEST

- Focus on a child-centred approach in education as a form of social innovation, specifically discussing its implications for migrant children and culturally diverse societies. Professor Mateja presented a case study highlighting that a child-centered approach is not just child-friendly but involves listening to children's voices and perspectives. The approach is particularly critical for integrating migrant children successfully and in addressing the challenges posed by cultural diversity in schools. The study emphasized the dangers of using a "deficit approach," which focuses on what migrant children lack. Instead, migrant children indicated that a sense of belonging and strong peer relationships were crucial for their integration and well-being.
- Panelists from various sectors, including NGOs and municipalities, discussed the practical implications. They emphasized the need for holistic approaches to social innovation, involving multiple stakeholders and policies at local, national, and international levels.
- Funding and the dynamic nature of social innovation were discussed as challenges. It was suggested that municipalities can learn from ongoing social innovation projects, even though these projects may require updating to remain effective as societal needs change.

Innovative support to social entrepreneurship in Croatia

WEDNESDAY, JUNE 14TH 4 PM - 6 PM CEST

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Curated by the University of Zagreb

- The webinar discussed innovative support for social entrepreneurship in Croatia. Jelena from the ACT Group, a Croatian ecosystem builder in the social economy sector, presented their methods of tackling community challenges. She highlighted the importance of both disruptive and incremental innovation, tailored to specific market demands.
- A support program focused on social service providers was introduced. The program offers mentoring, development of innovative services, and acts as an incubator for social enterprises.
- Participants also discussed the democratization of social enterprises, the role of academia, and the importance of governance models in enabling social innovation.
- The webinar concluded by emphasizing the need for a structured knowledge transfer methodology, especially involving teachers, to foster an environment conducive for social innovation.

EUREKA-Experiential Learning on Urban Innovation: the case of the Urban Living Lab in Giudecca (Venice)

MONDAY, JUNE 19TH 10.30 AM - 12.30 AM CEST

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Curated by Alma Mater University of Bologna and IUAV University of Venice

- The webinar focused on capacity building in urban innovation, highlighting the Urban Living Lab in Venice. It aims to co-create knowledge through public engagement and adopts a place-based approach to address social and spatial inequalities. The Lab has been implemented in real-world settings and includes both local and international activities. It experiments with new ways to engage the community, such as co-design modules, and faces challenges like academic tensions and the risk of naive community participation.
- Questions and comments from the audience centered around the project's real-world impact, especially concerning local authorities and community involvement. The project aims for long-term engagement and seeks to continue its work through additional grants and collaborations.

Data and Analytical Tools to Visualize Knowledge

WEDNESDAY, JUNE 21ST 4 PM - 6 PM CEST

Curated by the University of Tirana

- The webinar focused on Data and Analytical Tools to Visualize Knowledge. The main speaker, Doriano, discussed various tools for data visualization, focusing on case studies related to migration. Google's tools like Google Portal and Google Ngram were cited as easy-to-use resources for data gathering and analysis.
- The importance of big data and its role in research was highlighted, mentioning that there are around 200,000 scientific papers on migration alone. Therefore, tools for data visualization are crucial to sift through vast information.
- Several other participants shared their experience and tools in data collection and analysis, such as qualitative data analysis software and AI models for digitizing forest and rural areas.
- The webinar concluded with the notion that while paid, advanced tools offer in-depth analysis, free and simpler tools can provide a good starting point for researchers and NGOs without access to more complex software.

Strengthen the role of civil society through participatory design

MONDAY, JULY 3RD 4 PM - 6 PM CEST

on zoom

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Curated by Hellenic Open University

- The webinar focused on strengthening the role of civil society through participatory design and is a part of a series discussing social innovation. Technical and social aspects of participatory design were explored through two case studies. One project called "Local Watch" aims to empower local communities through involvement with municipal authorities, while another called "Participatory Lab" focuses on climate issues.
- Challenges and opportunities in the field of social innovation in Greece were discussed. The European Commission supports social innovation across multiple programs, but there is a lack of public policy discussion about it in Greece. A need for new financial tools, removal of administrative barriers, and more inclusive frameworks was highlighted.
- The discussion acknowledged the importance of creating physical spaces for community engagement and social groups to practice democracy. The role of participatory design in changing social power dynamics and fostering more inclusive democracy was emphasized.








What is your age? 91 responses




What is the highest level of education you have completed? 91 responses



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


How would you rate your overall experience of the webinar(s)? 91 responses




Did the case study method and the panel discussion (s) deepen your understanding of the topic? 91 responses








How likely is it that you to apply the knowledge gained through this webinar series in your work or personal life? 91 responses




What is your current level of familiarity with the concept of social innovation? 91 responses
